

Raymond C. Dee currently serves as the Chairman of the Board of Service Center Metals, an extrusion company located in Prince George, VA. Service Center Metals (SCM) was started in 2002 as a Greenfield operation and by 2008 its sales exceeded \$100 million annually. SMC currently employs 100 people. Ray also serves on the Board of a startup company in Bluffton, IN. Alexin LLC is a re-melt operation to make aluminum billet for the extrusion industry. This operation started in November of 2008 and the facility is the most modern, environmentally friendly, and energy efficient billet plant in the United States. Prior to these “current adventures,” Ray was the Managing Director of British Aluminium in the United Kingdom. He and his family lived in Europe for three years where he ran the extrusion operations for British Aluminium.

Ray’s career in the aluminum industry started with Alcoa International. He joined Alcoa after the Army where he served five years and attained the rank of Captain before returning to civilian life. Ray was with Alcoa for eleven years in a variety of sales and marketing positions. In 1979 he had the opportunity to help start the Cressona Aluminum Company in Schuylkill County, PA. Alcoa had shut the facility down in 1977 and Ray and his partners started it two years later. Cressona Aluminum went on to become the largest independent aluminum extruder in the United States. Ray was the Executive Vice President and a member of its Board of Directors. His responsibility at Cressona was for sales, marketing and metal management operations. Cressona grew to four plants throughout the U.S. and employed over 1,500 people. In 1995 the partners sold the company to Alumax.

Ray has served on numerous civic boards including the Good Samaritan Hospital Board and the Foundation for Free Enterprise Education, PFEW’s sponsoring organization. He is currently the Vice Chairman of the Board of St. Bonaventure University and co-chairs the school’s ongoing \$95 million capital campaign.

Ray and his wife Maureen split their time between Naples, FL in the winter, and Sag Harbor, NY in the summer. They are kept very busy with their six children and thirteen grandchildren, including a set of twins born last September. Ray is “making one last attempt” to master golf and enjoys power boating on Long Island Sound in New York.
