

## BIOGRAPHY OF SUSAN D. STAUB

Mrs. Susan Staub is a graduate of Emory and Henry College in Emory, Virginia, and is a former high school speech, English, and dramatics teacher. Philosophically committed to the Right to Work principle, she strenuously objected to the pressure to join the unified National Education Association union and had refused to join. Seeing the dangers to her profession posed by this and the growing demand by teacher union officials for compulsory unionism, Mrs. Staub decided the best way she could serve responsible education was to work actively for Right to Work. In 1971, she resigned her teaching position and joined the staff of the National Right to Work Committee. She was with the National Committee for 16 years, serving as Vice President of the Committee and Director of the Committee's education division, Concerned Educators Against Forced Unionism. In early 1987, Mrs. Staub was unanimously elected by the Board of Directors to the presidency of Pennsylvanians for Right to Work. She brings a wealth of experience and dedication to voluntary unionism to the Commonwealth.

Mrs. Staub also serves on the Board of Directors of the Foundation for Free Enterprise Education in Erie, and a voluntary teacher in the program. She is also one of the founders of the Pennsylvania Leadership Council in Harrisburg, and currently serves on their Board of Directors. Mrs. Staub also serves on the Advisory Board of the Allegheny Institute for Public Policy in Pittsburgh, on the Board of Directors of the Lincoln Institute of Public Opinion Research, Inc., in Harrisburg, and has served three three-year terms on the Board of Directors of the West Shore Chamber of Commerce. She was elected to the Board of Trustees of the PMA Foundation and to the Board of Directors of the Pennsylvania Manufacturers' Association in May 2003. In addition to her active service on these boards, Mrs. Staub also participates in various coalitions, working to change the public policy of Pennsylvania.

Mrs. Staub is a native of Staunton, Virginia, and resides in Shiremanstown.
