PFEW 2015 – Poised To Set New Records!

If you have been reading *PFEW News* for any period of time, you know that we have been experiencing a meteoric explosion in student interest/applications over the past several years. In response to that growth, our Board of Directors approved an expansion last year to a fifth full session. We expected to host some 2,000 students but, again because of yet another application explosion, ended up graduating 2,106 students in 2014 marking, by far, our largest program ever.

The “published” final date for applications is always at the beginning of April to give our school contacts across the state a target to set for their students. (In actuality, we will accept applications up until program time, space provided.) On last year’s deadline date, we had received 2,357 of the more than 3,200 we would ultimately receive. This year, on the final deadline date we had already received 2,541 applications, 184 more than at the same time last year! If this pace continues, and our history certainly indicates that it will, we will easily eclipse last year’s total graduates and may even see a class in excess of 2,300 students. In anticipation of that growth, we have already expanded the number of teams from the 111 who competed last summer to 120 for the coming five sessions.

In round numbers, there are approximately 1,000 high schools in Pennsylvania when taking into account public, parochial, charter, cyber, etc., etc. We also work closely with the Homeschoolers Association to make certain those young people are aware of the unique educational opportunity afforded by PFEW. In order to “get the word out” annually to the approximately 230,000 eligible students in the 10th and 11th grade, we must employ the talents and commitment of our dedicated school “presenters”

who actually spend much of the winter and most of the spring visiting classrooms throughout the 67 counties of Pennsylvania. It is a herculean effort that essentially begins immediately after the New Year and runs until classes adjourn in June. By the time the 2014-2015 school year concludes, we expect to have visited approximately 225 schools, delivering more than 750 individual class presentations. Additionally, we have attended and presented at scores of workshops and regional student events including: Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) regional workshops and state conventions; SkillsUSA conferences; as well as, numerous college and career fairs.

Once again, this statewide campaign was designed and led by our staff team of Michelle Warofka, Manager of Schools, and her very able assistant, Amber Goss. You can imagine the complexity of designing an efficient strategy of visiting so many schools in so many counties in such a short time. The challenge was further exacerbated by the extraordinarily difficult winter weather the team encountered. Each time a presentation was cancelled, it had to be rescheduled and fit into a subsequent trip.

To assist Michelle and Amber this year, we further expanded our “team” of outside schools presenters without whom all of the planning and strategy would be for naught. In addition to Michelle who herself visited over 90 schools, we had seven “primary” presenters

working in various regions throughout the state. Because of the “density” of schools in the southeastern region of the state, we need several dedicated folks to visit the many schools there that have made PFEW a part of their annual curriculum. Bucks County businessman Nate Cooper, himself an extremely successful entrepreneur, did yeoman’s duty throughout the southeastern counties of Pennsylvania and then ventured into the northeast, visiting Luzerne and Lackawanna counties where momentum for the program is really gaining speed. Nate has a very special connection to PFEW as his son Randy attended the program more than twenty years ago and that was when dad “caught the bug” for the program. He has been a passionate Company Advisor, Speaker and student representative for us for over two decades.

Assisting Nate and Sid in the southeastern corner of the state was Kate Transue, who herself is a graduate of the program and extremely passionate about bringing the message to other students. This year Kate focused her efforts primarily in Montgomery and Bucks counties, where we invariably draw the largest number of students on a per county basis.

Moving somewhat to the west, we were again blessed to have longtime volunteer Ken Snyder traveling the highways and byways throughout southcentral Pennsylvania and even journeying to both the northeast and southeast on occasion. Ken has been a perennial Advisor for seventeen years and also has served in a variety of other capacities. Again sporting his classic bowtie and sweater vest, Ken is now a familiar face in scores of central Pennsylvania schools, as well as, in schools in the northeast and southeast.

Spreading the “good news” about PFEW through the central, southcentral, northcentral and northeast regions of the state was PFEW alum Patrick Kennedy who was joining the team for the first time. With Patrick’s help we were able to visit many new counties and schools in the more rural areas of the state, particularly in northcentral and northeast PA. Also joining the team were Dylan Heagy and Vincent Stefanelli. Dylan, a PFEW graduate, helped out extensively in southwest and southcentral Pennsylvania while Vincent, a parent of a past-PFEW participant, spent more time in the snow belt of the northwest and northcentral regions of the

state. Dylan and Vinnie were particularly helpful to Michelle as these are regions where she necessarily must spend much of her own personal time as we have so many donors and requests for specific students from particular schools in those regions.

Helping out the “primary” presenters were a corps of dedicated volunteers who rendered their services on an “as needed” basis for particularly important events. Perennial Company Advisors Jim Golding and Dave Murphy both appeared at numerous conferences and student fairs, Jim focusing his attention in southwest Pennsylvania while Dave covered the central region for us. Travis Kellar, also a PFEW alum and perennial member of the summer staff, did a number of events for the Foundation in northeast Pennsylvania where he is now a professional journalist. Jamie Sheets, also a member of the summer staff similarly covered a variety of events in the Philadelphia area while Linda Nguyen, Aubrey Smyser and Carmen Scalzo offered their talents on a select basis at events and in counties throughout the state.

Including Michelle and Amber, our total Schools Team was comprised of sixteen men and women this year, the largest number we have ever put into the field. The results of their hard work are being reflected by the student applications pouring into the office each day. We expect the total number of applications to easily pass the 3,000 number by the end of the school year. Kudos to our incredibly dedicated and talented team of presenters who braved the elements throughout the winter months in order to bring the PFEW story to hundreds of high schools and thousands of students throughout the state. These are the men and women who ultimately will cause PFEW 2015 to be our largest program ever and we will be forever in their debt. Thank you all!

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Serious Revenue Shortfall

Our lead article in this issue began with a celebration that PFEW 2015 will, once again, set records as the largest program in our history. As our readers know, none of those 2,300+ students will get to the program without that precious \$575 scholarship made available by one of our donating companies, civic organizations or foundations.

Budgeting for any nonprofit is challenging and especially for one like ours that operates statewide and depends so much upon the health of the business climate. Necessarily we must make assumptions in the fall based on our donors' prior commitments. The Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program remains extremely important to many of the companies that make contributions for our students, especially as the economy remains challenging for so many of our folks.

This year, and without any warning, we received word that one of our largest donors will no longer be able to participate in the EITC program, resulting in the loss of about \$40,000 in gifts for our students. Coupled with that loss, at this writing we still have not heard from about 220 individual donors who made scholarship gifts to our students last year. Combined, and depicted in the graphic, we presently have achieved only 74% of this year's revenue needs with scarcely more than two months left before the first session of the program launches.

If you are one of our invaluable supporters, and have not yet made your commitment to local students applying to PFEW 2015, we really need your support for this year. Our message celebrating private enterprise and teaching young people to understand the challenges facing all Pennsylvania businesses has never been more important.

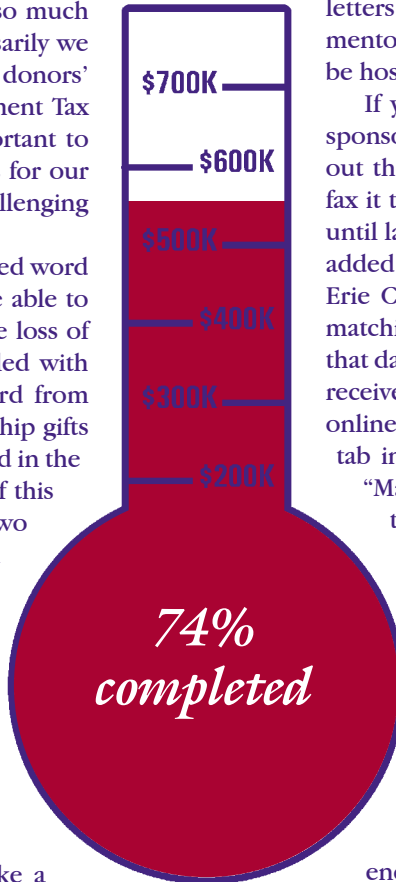
We would be very remiss if we did not take a moment to acknowledge and thank the more than 120 partnering organizations, chambers of commerce, manufacturers'

and employers' associations, and other business advocacy groups, that combined to help us reach out to nearly 70,000 businesses this spring, informing them about PFEW and its important mission. It is only through these outreach letters, signed by the executive of each organization, that we have been able to raise more than 200 new scholarships to help us reach our goal of accommodating over 2,300 students this summer. It is also through these outreach

letters we are able to recruit volunteers to be student mentors, speakers and judges for the five sessions we will be hosting.

Company Advisors Needed!

As more and more young people are interested in learning about the world of business, it does present us with some significant challenges. One of the most pressing at this point is having enough qualified "Company Advisors" to adequately staff all five sessions in July and August. With this number of students we will need 120 teams, called "companies", each team having its own Advisor to guide them through the week's activities.

It is under each Advisor's guiding hand that the "PFEW experience" comes alive for the participants. While no particular background in business or number of years of service is required, the primary prerequisite is that an Advisor love working with young people and be willing to spend the week with a particularly motivated group of young adults. PFEW subsidizes most of the Advisors' expenses in terms of food and program supplies and hotel accommodations are deeply discounted. Accommodations are also available on our host campuses in their upper class apartments for even greater savings.

This is a remarkable opportunity and one that frequently forges lifelong friendships between students and Advisors. In virtually all cases, first time Advisors report that they actually "took" more away



from the experience with these special young men and women, than they believed they contributed to them.

At this writing, we still have need for a number of Advisors, particularly in our final session which runs from Saturday, August 1st through Friday night, August 8th.
